

Adapting to a Changing World

While the world shifts and changes, some things remain the same — like the Society of St. Vincent de Paul's neverending care and compassion for the most vulnerable among us.

Over half a million Americans experience homelessness every year. Cost of living increases and inflation are leaving many families one car accident or medical emergency away from losing everything. Every year, SVdP puts tens of millions of dollars toward homelessness prevention through utility and rental assistance, keeping families and at-risk individuals off the streets.

We also keep families in their homes by making sure they don't have to decide which bills to pay, providing critical assistance through community kitchens, food pantries, low-cost medical and dental clinics, GED classes, and workforce development programs. Helping families access living wage employment and affordable housing leads to greater self-sufficiency, and dramatically increases the likelihood they'll avoid homelessness.

We also operate transitional housing, emergency shelters, and family serving those most in need.

Take Michael, a retired postal worker who moved closer to family after his wife of 50 years passed away. When his \$770 monthly social security check couldn't cover expenses, his local VA office found him a space at Ozanam Manor, SVdP Phoenix's transitional housing shelter.

Thanks to Vincentian volunteers and generous donors around the country, Michael had a safe place to stay, three hot meals daily, and a case manager to guide his rehousing journey. After just 100 days at Ozanam Manor, SVdP helped him find an apartment, paid his move-in expenses, and furnished his home through a voucher program.

"If they hadn't taken me in, I probably would have been just living out of my car," Michael said. "They got me back on my feet and found a place for me to stay. I was really happy to be there...."

Then there's Demisha. After a rough marital separation, double kidney failure diagnosis, and eviction, she had little hope. When SVdP Louisville provided affordable

housing, access to daily meals, and after-school support, Demisha and her daughter could rebuild their lives.

"We love it here. There's a lot of help..." says Demishia. "I'm not sure where I'd be without St. Vincent de Paul...if I went somewhere else, I probably wouldn't have a chance. I'm happy and blessed."

Not only does SVdP provide practical solutions to real-world problems for neighbors in more than 4,000 communities across the country, we also provide hope. As one guest at a Baltimore transitional housing facility said: "I can actually think about a real future now. I never thought this would be possible. I am just so grateful."

When the world shifts, SVdP adapts and responds, while remaining steadfast in providing person-to-person assistance and friendship to our neighbors in need across the country.
